He not only reads during the month allotted, but also continues on with his class. This year Janis and John Edel, Wanda June and Lesley Brouse also participated. We also send volunteers to the Reading Intervention program as well as Lunch Bunch. These two programs are once a week each week all year long-allowing us to have a more personal impact on the lives of the children we work with. The children and the school welcome us with open arms. The smiles are huge, hugs abound...I encourage you to consider joining us over there next year!

The work at the Mission of Yahweh is growing. We have a couple of mother daughter teams now as well as a family who come to serve and chat with the residents and children. Ascension is a group the residents look forward to seeing, both for the Lunch with Friends on the first Saturday of the month, as well as the occasional additional efforts.

A big shout out to David and Jackie Bergquist! David fashioned the collection center in the Parish Life Building. We collect items that WHAM needs...items you normally toss out. We need egg cartons, paper grocery bags, plastic grocery bags, small containers of toiletries from hotel rooms (that you have





not opened), and condiment packages from your takeouts. Jackie is the unseen angel who gathers up

the items from the box in the Narthex as well as the collection center to take them to WHAM. Small changes-big impacts. Thank you for caring and helping!

As this newsletter goes to press, we are preparing for ReachOut days off and on campus this year. This is one of our opportunities to enrich our relationships with our partners in the community as well as add new partners. We are making get well cards for patients in West Houston Hospital, which is the closest hospital to us. In

This year, we will provide washcloths and tube socks for the homeless at WHAM; a Mother's Day remembrance for mothers at Mission of Yahweh as well as the get well cards. And along the way...we will enjoy the company of our brothers and sisters at Ascension. I pray you joined us...and will join us as we venture out personally in our community.

It is the responsibility of the Jr. Warden, to maintain the building and grounds of Ascension Episcopal Church. As your Jr. Warden for 2017, I attended the Warden's and Vestry Conference held February. My attendance was rewarded by a workshop specifically aimed at the task of maintaining our parish's buildings, grounds and other physical facilities.

The title of this workshop was Is Your Building Ready for Hospice?, and was described as follows:

"Is deferred maintenance becoming a visible, but unstated core value in your congregation? Have you become attached to the frayed carpeting in the Nave? Does the peeling paint give your building a 'historic feel'? Let's talk about how we can become better stewards of the facilities we inherited from those who came before and assure we leave well-maintained facilities to those who follow."

The workshop was presented by Bob Shore, the Manager of Church Plants and Strategic Development, for the Diocese of Texas. I was struck by the fact that our diocese believes this topic is important enough to employ a full time manager. The workshop attracted 28 attendees.... so this topic must be of interest to a number of parishes. While it is important to guide our efforts with values, mission, and vision it seems to me that we also need to maintain the church and school to be a good member of our community and accomplish the vision we have claimed.

Your Property Committee has been busy so far this year with the small projects listed below:

- Replacement of the light which shines on the rose window from the inside so it is illuminated and therefore part of how the public views our sanctuary during hours of darkness.
- Repair of leaking toilet in the men's restroom in the narthex
- Repair and replacement of a large number of plumbing components in the Ascension Episcopal School's (AES) buildings. We are thankful that the school paid for these repairs and they did not have to stay on the list of deferred maintenance below.
- Thorough cleaning and re-calibration of both the refrigerator and freezer in the parish hall kitchen.
- Completed quarterly planned preventative maintenance on all of the heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) systems on the entire campus.
- Replacement of the griddle in the parish hall kitchen. It failed after thirty plus years of service. Fresh bacon shall return to the breakfast menu!

Deferred Maintenance and other outstanding projects which remain to be addressed:

- Repair of portions of the lawn watering system which have been unusable for many months. This repair could help prevent further loss of bushes and other landscaping.
- Replacement of high wattage lights on the ground outside the west and north-east sides of the sanctuary. These lights illuminate the exterior of our primary worship building and make it more visible from Seagler Rd.
- Replacement of interior lighting in several areas of every building on campus. *"under-lighted rooms naturally reduce the energy of the people in the room, particularly in worship spaces "*Bob Shore. Visitors notice this and may decide not to return.
- Cleaning of air conditioning duct work in each of the AES buildings.

- Investigation of ceiling tile stains in parish hall to determine if an active leak is present.
- Replacement of several exterior lights around campus. *Exterior lighting is the cheapest security measure available.*

As with your personal household, the primary factor delaying progress on these projects is financial. If you have skills to use in maintaining our church home, please volunteer your time and talent. If you are in support of any of these tasks, or others you have noticed, please consider making a contribution to the Building Fund or Major Maintenance Fund. If you have a preference on which projects should take priority, please let any of us know. We all thank you for your continued good stewardship of our Parish's earthly buildings and grounds.



THE PEOPLE'S SONG



Here we are in the middle of Eastertide, in the 500th anniversary year of the Reformation. Let's survey our music for this season. Hymn 183, Christians, to the Paschal victim, was beloved from the Middle Ages throughout the 12th C. Over 60 manuscripts were considered for authorship, and there were quite a few less spiritual parodies from Catholic sources such as 'Christians are fleeing the most wicked deceptions of Luther.' It is likely that this hymn originated in



Germany, as a dramatic dialogue between Mary Magdalen and a narrator. Luther's use of the German vernacular interspersed with Latin helped spread Reformation-era hymns and reworked hymns. Hymn 184, Christ the Lord is risen again! was one of his favorites. As he liked to say, one might tire of other hymns, but (this hymn) was 'always fresh.' Luther reworked (183 and its subsequent 184) into a hymn structure that we would recognize. He then used that as raw material for the hymn (185/6) Christ lay in death's strong bands. Luther's basic formula for adapting hymns was to use the original first stanza and then add his own stanzas to that. He wanted to tell the Easter story in a fuller manner, and often wrote 7 stanzas, considering 7 to be the 'perfect' number, the number of 'completion.'

A much easier tune for us is the Dutch Easter carol, Hymn 192, This joyful Eastertide. This 1684 Mennonite hymn was originally titled, Concerning the necessity of Christ's resurrection. The music simply exudes joy, with the rising statements of is arisen, arisen, arisen, arisen!

The text of hymn 193, That Easter day with joy was bright, dates from the 5th C. and is paired with a 16th C. tune. By 1632, it had been edited to the format we sing today, retaining its strong Easter message.

Hymn 180, He is risen, he is risen! comes from the hymnal, A Christian Year for Children, 1846. Hymn 199, Come ye faithful, raise the strain, comes to us from the Greek Orthodox tradition. Hymns 203 and 206 are the same hymn O sons and daughters, separated by texts for specific Sundays. This 15th C. chant-like French noel first appeared in an Episcopal hymnal in 1916.

Hymn 208, Alleluia! The strife is o'er was destined to be popular. The tune was written by Palestrina, who was considered by the Catholic church to be the perfect composer. He wrote melodious tunes that avoided any harsh harmonies or difficult passages.

Please have a look at all our Eastertide hymns. There are too many for me to discuss them all. We have a rich assortment of styles, yet they all convey the same message of the glories of Easter and what it means for us.

ORPHANAGE MISSIONS TO NIGERIA FROM MARCH-DEC. 2016

How it all started:

I give God all glory for laying in my heart this year-2016 (as I was having my regular quiet time) the burden to feed His Children-"The Orphans." The mandate was so strong that I could not resist it, although fears gripped me immediately. I Questioned- 1. Feed Who? The Orphans? 2. Where would I get the resources? 3. Lord Why now am retired when I don't have the money to do it? Why did you not give me this responsibility while I was working and sure of regular income? Etc. etc. etc. With all my series of questions the consistent mandate was to Feed His Children. After I was exhausted with all arguments, questions, and excuses why it was not apt now, to take on such responsibilities while I had plans in place to enjoy my years of retirement. I broke out in tears-crying, confused, and unsure where, and how to start. I did not want to talk about it, and I did not want to get anyone involved. Little did I know that it was not just my personal business but God's Mandate which must go per His Plan. I am not an Evangelist nor Missionary but I try to support others who are doing it, so I had no firsthand experience how to organize and implement this kind of "Orphanage Mission."

With prayer supports from the faithful Christian associates, plans began to be clear to me. The awesome God started to overwhelm me with provisions of items for this Mission from my resource, which He provided and through various individuals. I purchased out of pocket the much I could afford-boxes of cereals and noodles. I therefore express my deep heart felt gratitude to all those who have made this "Orphanage Mission" kick off in March 2016 and still waxing strong.

Donors to the "Orphanage Mission:" MS Claribbatte Dominguez-6 Boxes (24 Cans in each box) of Canned Milk Formula for Children. These listed items made up the first 2 packed Cartons shipped March 28th 2016 from Houston to my contact at Awka-Sir ChukwuEzugo Nwigbo. Sir Nwigbo received the shipment in June. Then he contacted the Vicar of his Church-All Saints Church Amenyi Awka, where these items were presented during a Sunday Church Service. The Six Officiating Priests and all Congregation present prayed over these two cartons each with its seal intact. Then the Senior Vicar invited two women and gave them scissors to cut the tapes off the cartons. The women were directed to share the contents of each carton into three equal parts for the three Orphanages in the City of Awka. At the end the sharing, the Vicar designated A Priest, Sir Nwigbo, and A Church member to send these items that Sunday-June 18th 2016, to the three Orphanages at Awka namely:

- Model Motherless Babies Home-Ministry of Women Affairs & Social Development Awka.
- Faith Community Children's Home Awka.
- Tender Love Orphanage Awka.

Information from Sir Nwigbo revealed that in each Orphanage, the Staff who received the items signed off and documented all the inventory received, then these staff, along with the available children prayed over the donations, blessing all those who extended such alms to them.



To my greatest surprise, the Director of each of the three Orphanages called me here in Houston by the end of June 2016, to express their individual gratitude for such a surprise gift, for which they all now call me as Nickname- "Mommy that sends food from America to "The Motherless Children." Literally meaning that the children expressed great joy eating food from "America!" And more so that those they did not even know or have met before, were led to think about their welfare.

Can you imagine the joy your donation's put in these recipient's hearts, and their prayers to bless the donors, and all involved to make sure that the items got to them for their enjoyment? May my Awesome God bless all those who were involved in the process of the first shipment (March-June 2016), delivery, and



distribution to the three orphanages and ensured that these children ate and enjoyed the nourishments sent to them.

Donors to the Second shipment were:

- Mr. & Mrs. Carlos and Maria Torress-4 cans of Infant Formula with some Pacifiers.
- Rev Dr. George Moses
- Rev. & Rev. Mrs. Remy/Margaret Michael
- Pastor Happy Odoemena.

The above men and women of God donated a total of \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollar very close to my departure to Nigeria in July 2016. This trip was to go and visit the Orphanages ahead of time before the arrival of the second shipment.

I then bought various food items-Boxes of cereals. Different kinds of Noodles, and Children's Snacks. These items were shipped in July and they were delivered to the Orphanages Sept. 26th 2016 via the same process whereby the first shipment was delivered to them, as described above.

For this second shipment, I gave my contact the \$100.00 (donated)-equivalence of =N=37,000.00 (Thirty-Seven Thousand Naira) which was the exchange rate in July. The Thirty-Seven Thousand Naira was not enough to buy two large bags of rice, so I made it up with extra money to purchase two bags of rice and pay for the transportation to and from market with their delivery to the two Orphanage Homes as well.

When I got to Awka in July 2016, I called the directors of the three Orphanages and made appointment with each for a visit to their individual Centers. I was only given the opportunity to visit and see the children in: Model Motherless Babies Home-Ministry of Women's Affairs and Social Development; and Faith Community



Children's Home. I toured, visited with the children and staff of these two homes at their respective appointed dates and time. It was like a goose chase with the Director of Tender Love Orphanage. At a point, she stopped responding to my phone calls. My further inquiry revealed that the later was a privately-owned Orphanage and maybe she feared that I may have come to "spy" on her. On that note, I decided and instructed to share the second shipment when it arrives, to the two "Orphanages that showed elements of transparency, that the donated items were given to the children for which they were sent. Hence the two bags of rice were distributed-a bag each to these two Orphanages, who threw their doors open to visitation and provided me with the histories about their children's progress/ welfare from one stage to another. They also provided the record of the items that they received June 18th 2016 from Sir Nwigbo and his companions. These were great encouragement that the items did not end up in oblivion. Thanks immensely with innumerable Blessings to all of us who made the second shipment happen.

Third Shipment to Lagos State Nov 2016:

I am buying items for the third and final shipment for 2016. Currently I have not received any donations yet. But the Lord's provision is that I got 60 Boxes of Cereals on sale, which I already purchased. I am targeting other food items to go on sale. If not, I am planning to send these third shipment by this Nov. to Lagos State to an Orphanage at Igando Alimosho Local Govt. Area Lagos State. I have already found a contact to oversee that delivery when it arrives, about late January or early February 2017.



Selected Needs for The Orphanages:

Food & Snacks: Information from my inquiries about the most desired needs of the Orphanages in Nigeria revealed that it is nourishment (food), because so many organizations who sponsored them in the past had stopped due to hard times, and they are currently being sustained on God's mercies through various individuals. In fact, I observed one of them during the Children's Lunch, and I teared seeing what these children were fed as lunch.

For anyone who desires to donate- Any food for children, for which the expiratory date would last beyond June 2017 is welcome. Also financial assistance for shipment and cost for delivery to the orphanages is welcome too.

Items for Beginning Education: The children need Educational Materials like: Books for e.g. Counting Numbers, Letters of the Alphabets, Animals, Other Objects (table, Tree, Plate etc.), Rhymes, Exercise Books and Drawing/Coloring Books, Pencils, Crayons, + Other Coloring Materials etc.

Items for Socializing & General Child Development:

Toys for individual and group interactions, CDs' for Cartoons, Children's Fictions, Skits/Dramas, TV/ Projectors, and Equipped Play Grounds for Socializations etc.

During my tour of the two Orphanages in July 2016 at Awka, I observed that most often the babies were either "bodied" (carried) by the staff or left in their cribs awake being lonely or asleep. I could not remember seeing a baby who was awake interacting with a toy. There are many needs but the above few are what in my observation, are necessities to consider as an immediate need for these children.

From the brief histories of the two Orphanages I visited, I noted that there was not yet any definite plan/s for transiting the children into the community when they are fully grown, or when the space in the Orphanage may not be enough to accommodate as many as would need such care I learnt that currently when they are faced with overcrowding, they solicit for the children's' family members e.g. Grandmother or any other willing relative to take them, in order to create space/s for others babies in acute need.

Again, thanks to everyone who was a part of this "Orphanage Mission" to Nigeria in year 2016. May God's favor continue to find you in Year 2017 and many more years of your life Amen! Please I am open to constructive suggestions on how to in "Best Practices" to do this Orphanage Mission to the Glory and Edification of Christ in it all.


