
One of the best parts about it though is how much fun the adults have sharing with the children....just ask one of us about our kids!

Welcome to 2016! It will be weeks, if not months, before I get used to writing that one. Now that the hustle and bustle of Christmas is over, we are ready to get back to work in Sunday school! For the next couple of weeks, our kids will learn stories about Jesus when he was a boy and young adult, and then.....it will be Lent. Lent seems to begin so early this year, starting on February 10th. That means there are only 6 ½ weeks between the time we celebrate the birth of Jesus and all the joy that it brings, and the beginning of the season in which we observe the passion, pain and triumph of Lent and Easter. As adults, we can understand the symbolic


nature and rhythm of the Christian year. However, for a child who is much more literal, the short period of time between the baby Jesus and the adult Jesus, whom we crucify and bury, is way too short.

So, how can we help our young concrete learners embrace the meaning of Lent and Easter without scaring them? During children's Sunday school, we will be teaching a children's version of a Lenten series, allowing them to learn all about the stories of repentance, forgiveness, community, sadness and joy. They'll learn about our special Lenten worship services, beginning with Ash Wednesday. They'll learn that yes, even Jesus experienced death and burial, but that death was not the end for Him, just as it is not the end for us as believers because Jesus has promised to bring us into a life more wonderful than anything we can fathom.

They'll learn and experience all of this with the loving guidance of our wonderful Sunday school volunteers. We hope to see your children there!

Mission Trip 2016 - Return to Dulac!

The Mission Trippers from Ascension had such a wonderful experience in Dulac last year that we've decided to return! Our 2016 mission trip is scheduled for June 5 – 10. It is open to everyone ages 5 through 105. Children from the age of 5 through 5th grade must be accompanied by a parent, but any youth in grades 6 through 12 are allowed to travel without a parent and will be supervised by Ascension staff. The cost for the trip is \$250, however we are hoping to offset much of that cost with



money raised through our fundraising efforts. Last year we kicked off our fundraising by selling water balloons to throw at Fr. Todd. This year's kickoff will be even more fun! The Episcopal Diocese of Texas Office of the Bishop

January 4, 2016

Dear Clergy and Laity of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas:

You are undoubtedly aware that on January 1, 2016, persons licensed to carry a concealed handgun became entitled to carry them openly—in a holster—in most public places in Texas. Sadly, at the same time the Legislature also removed the gun-free protection that churches previously enjoyed under prior law. Fortunately, however, the Legislature affirmed that churches—like other property owners—have the legal right to exclude handguns from their property by taking affirmative steps to do so.

I want to be very clear: notwithstanding the change in Texas law, our longstanding policy in the Diocese of Texas remains the same—guns have no place in our churches, schools, and institutions. Other than those carried by officers of the peace or security officers on duty, we will adhere to our policy prohibiting guns on church and school property because we believe that our responsibility is to promote an atmosphere of peace and safety. The presence of firearms on church property is inconsistent with our diocesan vision of evangelism, service, and reconciliation.

Each of our congregations, schools, and institutions needs to communicate to its employees and constituents our expectation that guns will not be brought onto its property. At my request, our diocesan chancellor David Harvin has analyzed the new law and offered the attached suggestions on how congregations, schools, and institutions can implement our gun-free policy in light of what the new legislation requires. I expect the governing bodies of our churches, schools and institutions now to adopt measures that are appropriate for their own circumstances to implement our gun-free policy.

Please read the following enclosure from a posture of prayer. I am deeply grateful for your cooperation on this matter.




God's Word Read Aloud in God's House by God's People

We are continuing our tradition at Ascension of reading the Bible from Genesis through Revelation during Lent. Readings are approximately 30 minutes and are scheduled on weekday mornings, evenings (except Wednesdays) and Saturday mornings. You may use the Bible on the lectern or your own. You may read in the language of your choice. You may stand or sit and if access is difficult you may sit in the pews.

Sign up for a reading and include your email address. You will be sent an email reminder a couple of days before your reading. You may sign up online starting at the beginning of February on the church website, by clicking on the front page link. There will also a sign up sheet near the name tag table in the narthex on Sunday morning. Come to the church at the scheduled time and read aloud the verses assigned. The church will be open and the lights in the altar area turned on. If for some reason you find the church locked, the office has the key. If you wish to have an audience, you must bring your own. You may share this experience with a friend or church member or read on your own. It is suggested that you preview your reading the night before. If you would prefer to read at noon, choose the last reading in the morning or the first reading in the evening on that day and slide it to noon.

Please note that the Sunday paper sign-up and the online sign-up will be combined on Monday, and the newest version printed out the Friday before Sunday. So what this means, is if you sign-up late Friday or on Saturday, you will not see your name reflected on the sign-up sheet, but you are signed up. Last year we did not have any conflicting shifts, but if for some reason there is this year, Pam Schwabrow will simply contact the two parties that have signed up. One may choose to take a different time slot, or share the time. It will be up to you. Remember in the Bible it says "...make a joyful NOISE unto the Lord,..." so come as you are and read as you can.

Did you see the Family Circus cartoon in the 12/31/15 newspaper? "Guess what, Mommy! It's only 87 days till Easter!" I read (between the lines) an implication that there's nothing important until then. Well, that's just not so. Yes, Christmas and Easter are major celebrations. They are also part of the full continuum that is our Christian calendar year. We anticipate Christ with Advent, we rejoice when Christmas comes, and Epiphany continues as the joy of Christ is shared. These are three distinct seasons of anticipation, joy, and fulfillment.

On 01/10, the parish choir will sing *Christmas Joy* by Mark Schweizer. We are reminded that Christmas has meaning beyond the day itself:

When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky has withdrawn, When the kings see their prophesy rightly fulfilled, when the princes and shepherds have gone, Then the true work of Christmas begins...

On the last day in the Season of Epiphany (02/03), there is a turn in the mood. It is bright and joyful with celebration of the Transfiguration. It is also the last Sunday before Lent begins.

On 02/03, the choir will sing *Farewell to Alleluia* by Olin Jones. As you know, we don't sing alleluia during Lent, as it is a penitential season. (Ever wonder where Alleluias go during Lent?) The second stanza reminds us:

Alleluia cannot always be our songwhile here below; Alleluia our transgressions make us for awhile forego; for the solemn time is coming when our tears for sin must flow. Therefore, in our hymns we pray Thee, grant us blessed Trinity. At the last to keep thine Easter, In our home beyond the sky. There to Thee forever singing Alleluia joyfully.

There is so much more happening at this time of year than simply waiting for another holiday. And, as we grow through these seasons, we can appreciate Easter more fully when it does arrive.


ACTIVITIES AND ONGOINGS

Altar Flowers



Rector's Log 2016

Numbers

As we look to a new year, we have several challenges and opportunities. You will notice our pledge numbers, average Sunday attendance and total estimated giving are slightly down. We had quite a few deaths as well as older congregants moving across the country to be with family. This challenge will be overcome by attracting newcomers with excellent worship, service, and fellowship. We are getting a small budget haircut for 2016.

We still have lots of newcomers, many of whom are calling Ascension their church home. One reality of younger parishioners is they tend to give less that well established congregants. However, if we continue to be a place people choose to encounter the living Christ, we cannot go wrong.

People

Paul Belk and Nancy Ginsburg have transitioned away from Ascension and we are delighted that Suzanne Anderson will be taking the helm of the music department at least through Easter in Nancy's absence. The newcomer minister position was a diocesan grant that cannot be renewed after the third year. We are in the process of finding a very part-time children's choir leader. We also said good bye to long time Ascension employee Reginald Johnson, which allowed us to call Miguel Agustin-Dimas to work maintaining the facility.

Facility

Parish Life Bldg

The parish life building remains largely unchanged except for the parish secretary and rector's office. Both Sam and I will have our office in the old sanctuary / school admin building. This will allow more babies and early walkers to join the school. My previous office has become the Sunday morning child care room. The church library and children's chapel remain unchanged.

Rationale: We do not currently have a pressing need from classroom space on Sunday morning while the school is growing and can use PLB space to open enrollment for more kids. I want to emphasize, the church retains all authority to reallocate space based on need.

Challenge: Let's create a pressing need for Sunday morning classroom space by inviting families to be part of our community. If you look back at our 50th Anniversary booklet (p20), we had 140 kids from PreK to High School with 34 adult leaders in 1983. The only way we will achieve even half that is through actively inviting families to be part of our community and having great programs for kids.

Assessment: In order for us to not hinder, in any way, the church's growth, the church will reevaluate space allocation every year or earlier if needed.

Challenge 2: See my section on summer and fall that offers one piece of the puzzle to support church growth. We are exploring moving Sunday School time to be in the middle of the 10:30 service like it was in the mid 1970's. We are thinking about getting into the groovy wayback machine and combining Sunday School and worship! This will help us really support your work of inviting families.

I see space allocation as a benefit to the church and school. First floor real estate is very important for small child care. This will increase our foot traffic, help the school increase its enrollment, and create a pathway to the church.

Parking lot

You probably noticed our newly resurfaced parking lot. Thanks to the tireless work of the Vestry we were able to complete this in 2015. Almost! The contractor for the lot broke the drainpipe in the school carpool line. It currently drains very slowly. We considered legal action, but deferred as it would take too much money to make it worth the hassle. We hope to have the drainage problem fixed in early 2016.

A/C

The school had an air conditioner failure that has been fixed.

Sabbatical

From Diocese of Texas sabbatical guidelines: A sabbatical is defined as a clergyperson taking at least three months away from their primary ministry: for rest, refreshment, recreation, travel, reading, study, hobbies and the renewal of personal relationships.

I have been blessed to receive a Diocesan Sabbatical grant of \$7500 from the Quinn foundation. The mission of The Bishop Quin Foundation is to help build the Church. Quinn's mission is facilitated by the clergy of the Diocese of Texas taking sabbatical time, resulting in the holistic care, growth and development of its excellent clergy.

I have had lots, I mean lots of ideas for sabbatical. It ranged from interviewing preachers around the world, to traveling through five of the ten national Episcopal seminaries. Then I spitballed ideas of interviewing the rural elderly for an audio journal. Are you tired yet?

In conversations with many clergy, bishops, a lay people, I have come to the conclusion that less is more. I want to take a long road trip (Midwest and south) with the family, write a lot, and possibly get certified as a yoga teacher (unless it is cost prohibitive, so then maybe not).

Mike Black, our Senior Warden, has graciously accepted a second year term and will be helping me figure out a plan of action in my absence from mid May to mid August. We already have two long term supply clergy who have agreed - The Rev. Will Hood (recently re-licensed in the Diocese) and Bob Flick (currently working with the Episcopal Health Foundation and retired from Lord of the Streets ministry.) We only have three weeks that are still to be covered by priestly ministry.

Summer and Fall

I have asked Robi to lead a focus group to think about how our common life could be better served with some modifications to Sunday School and fellowship on Sunday. We are not going to consider changing service times. However, the formation habits of parents have changed dramatically in the last 5 years across congregations. Sunday School is becoming more and more optional. I have asked Robi to think about how we might better serve parents while answering our call to form disciples for Jesus.

The big change, *might* include moving Sunday School from 9:30am into 10:30 worship. Logistically that means after the opening song in 10:30 worship, Sunday School age kids are invited but not required to go to Sunday School (same location as current Sunday school) for about 30mins. They would come back in time for communion. Children's Chapel volunteers and Sunday School volunteers would be invited to join one large pool of child ministry volunteers. As much as I love Children's Chapel, there are 25 kids missing a deeper formation opportunity by not attending Sunday school.

This could allow us to have three offerings in the regular school year at 9:30. Kid's program (music or drama practice), Adult choir practice, and adult formation. This is still in the "think tank" stage and we will be inviting ministry volunteer and leader input over the coming Spring semester and we might try it on for size in the summer.

We cannot sit back and hope for the best. I challenge you to help Ascension grow through volunteering your time and inviting families to be part of our community. All are welcome, but they often don't come unless we bring them.

Change of gear -

Civil conversations

2016 is the time to stop yelling at your phone, family, or TV! In the midst of very uncivil conversations in the US about trigger issues, I believe we can continue the highest level of kindness in all of our conversations, both one-on-one and through electronic media.

I have this hope that we can continue to be people who bring the light of Christ to a dark world. We are marked by God to be as a community of faith in which we honor each other's strongly held beliefs. Our convictions are too important to trivialize with yelling and attacks.

Issues like politics, race, sexuality, guns, and law enforcement culture are things we should talk about as people of faith. But as your pastor, please do not hope that I will advocate for your particular belief, except Jesus! Scripture might be helpful for understanding where I am coming from:

Joshua 5:13-14 Now it came about when Joshua was by Jericho, that he lifted up his eyes and looked, and behold, a man was standing opposite him with his sword drawn in his hand, and Joshua went to him and said to him, "Are you for us or for our adversaries?" He said, "No; rather I indeed come now as captain of the host of the LORD."

No, I don't see myself as a "captain of the host of the Lord," but you have given me a sacred responsibility. God has called me to help us be a family, a family with Christ at the head of the table. We can be better than the stereotypical family that gets together on Thanksgiving and chooses to yell at one another then zone out in front of the TV. I think we can model a different way, a way of love for everyone.

Practical Matters

If someone volunteers with beliefs that make you feel uncomfortable as a ministry leader, let me know so that I might help everyone involved. Especially with hot button topics like human sexuality. With the Supreme Court decision making same-sex marriage national law, I want to reiterate the commitment I made to you when I came to Ascension.

As a commitment to Ascension, I will not sponsor for ordination nor marry same-sex couples. However, I take seriously my diocesan responsibility to be a pastor for all people. If someone is not a fit for Ascension, I am expected to work very hard to find a fit for them within the larger Episcopal church.

We are stronger together

The members of Ascension are diverse in many ways, and our beliefs are varied as well. I would like for this community to make space for civil conversation and for genuine disagreement. Let us remember that it is Jesus who makes us a family; Jesus is the one who make strangers family and enemies friends. May we find a way to genuinely love and cherish people different from us.
